Member Snapshot

Maureen Mathieson

Maureen grew up in Hudson, in the house in which she now lives with her husband, Todd (also an AVCC member). Her love of photography began with her dad, who worked for Polaroid in 1974 as a mechanical engineer. Maureen would help him test the new SX-70 cameras (precursor to the Polaroid Sun) that he brought home. She remembers him using home movie cameras. After he took family movies, she and he would splice the film to make better movies.

Maureen took photos with an Instamatic until she got her first SLR at age 26. She got involved in the camera club in 1993-94 after seeing a photo exhibit at Hudson National Bank (the current Avidia Bank). She served as AVCC President from 2000-2004. Maureen is also a judge, which contributes to AVCC because clubs in the same region trade judges to keep costs down. She has been judging for 15 years at clubs such as Nashoba, Greater Lynn, and Leominster. She has no formal training such as that put on by PSA, but has attended presentations on what judges look for. Maureen points out that important qualities of judging are being comfortable speaking in public and being skillful in giving polite but honest feedback. Maureen is also the keeper of the AVCC historical archive (enormous scrapbook) into which she puts articles, photos of club outings, etc. She then brings it to club outings for other members to look at.

In 2014 Maureen and Todd were awarded the honor of Master Member of New England Camera Club for their 15-year dedication to setting up and working "Photo-Ops" at NECCC and at AVCC. It is not just a physical set-up, but also includes Maureen and Todd helping photographers learn to shoot black light, still life, and water drops. Images from the water drop set-up have been presented in AVCC competitions from time to time.

We've all seen Maureen's butterfly images! Maureen says that she has been "chasing butterflies" since she was three years old. She doesn't even have to think about it when asked what her favorite subject is to shoot – the answer just pops out. She is passionate about butterflies both as a photographer and as a Citizen Scientist. She has participated in Monarch Health – a community science project through the University of Georgia in which volunteers sample wild monarch butterflies to help track the spread of a parasite specific to monarchs across North America. Every summer Maureen nurtures monarchs as they go through the stages of their life cycle in about a month's time. Once they are fully developed, she releases them.

Maureen started her professional life as a research chemist, specifically a medicinal chemist. She worked for more than 10 years at Eisai Inc. and Dupont. She began to feel that the lab was a lonely work environment and decided to shift into education. She started teaching middle school Science in 1996 in W. Newbury, and just received her 20-year certificate from Whitcomb Middle School in Marlborough, MA.

Maureen has been involved with Alpha Phi Omega (APO) (<u>https://apo.org/about-us/</u>), a co-ed service fraternity, since her college days at Worcester Polytechnic Institute. APO's vision is to "create inclusive communities for a more peaceful world in which to make a life, by developing leaders, uniting members through friendship and rendering service to all." APO holds conventions and does weekend trainings. They organize and run events like campus blood drives and clothing drives. She led weekend leadership trainings for them from Maine to Missouri, and served as President from 1983-85.

In 2000 Maureen met Todd "over a bowl of M&Ms" at a party given by his best friends, one of whom happened to be a colleague of Maureen's. She said one of the "hooks" was that Dick Francis was both of their favorite author. Maureen introduced Todd to photography and lent him her camera for a trip he took to San Diego. They went on a camera club outing to a huge trade show put on by Hunt's in Boston. Todd joined the club in 2001 and they now go on a lot of trips together both for the sheer pleasure of traveling as well as pursuing new images to share with family, friends and fellow competitors. Some of the places they traveled to were trips with other camera club members: Nova Scotia (2008); Montreal Balloon Fest (2009); Florida (2010); Washington St.; whale watches; and the Roger Williams and Southwick zoos. They also shoot in National Parks, wildlife refuges, and art museums. Travel Photography Recommendations

Robyn Saur

I usually always use my iPhone for travel. It's light, it takes great pictures, and you can take a picture real quick. And now an IPhone can shoot in raw so any image you really like make sure you shoot it in raw. Unless you are on a photo tour, I highly recommend using an iPhone. I usually will bring another camera with limited lenses so I'm not carrying too much.

Usually when traveling with a friend or on a tour there is only limited time to take pictures. You and the others want to enjoy the sites without someone keeping them waiting while you are setting up a tripod and getting the right composition. Usually I will remember the great areas I'm in and go back there after the tour so I have time to myself and better daylight to photograph a place. End of day, sunset or even dawn are better times of day to get out your better camera and photograph sites you previously visited.

Also put your iPhone images in an album on your iPhone so you can easily go thru them when you get home. You can even make a video out of your images.

John Houldsworth

Travel photography is one of my favorite subjects! Since retiring 10 years ago, together with my wife Bernadette, I have travelled to many parts of the globe from Antarctica to the Arctic photographing landscapes, people, animals, icons etc....you name it?

in 2013, I bought 2 x Canon 6D cameras since they are full frame and have built in GPS for image location in metadata - eg. In Antarctica, I used my 2 x Canon 6D cameras, one with a wide angle lens and the other with a telephoto lens since due to cold temperatures changing lenses in action is impractical. I then transfer images to Google Drive cloud storage (2TB - \$10/mo cloud storage) and index in Google Photos (with unlimited image resolution / free version limits file size to 1MB). Google photos allows me to easily search my image database by date, place, subject eg. family member name etc...

10 years on, I was beginning to find my camera kit too heavy to lug around and this year, after much deliberation, I invested in a Canon EOS R7 mirrorless camera with 18-150 mm lens and hand strap. This together with my Samsung S22 Ultra Smartphone now gives me the perfect lightweight travel kit! Connecting my R7 and Smartphone via bluetooth I can tag all images with GPS location metadata. Also, the Smartphone produces amazing images in itself!

I will be 89 years old in a couple of months. Sometimes, I find it hard and very tiring to walk to spots in the woods where I can create nature images, especially when the trail is up and down and filled with roots. I bought a very light walking stick that converts to a seat. The walking stick is literally a life saver helping me not to fall, especially when I am alone. Sitting down is welcome to permit rest and recovery and to make it easier to steady a hefty long lens while seated. The cane weighs $2.2Ibs \pm 5\%$. It feels very light. Tips and Tricks - October's Theme: Travel Photography

Tips for Travel Photography

Bustling cities, charming towns. Colorful people and customs. Contemporary architecture, ancient ruins. Breathtaking landscapes. Travel provides a unique and golden opportunity to expand our horizons and explore different environments and cultures. It is a vehicle to help bridge divides and build community within our very diverse world. That which makes us different also makes us fascinating, and there is much to be learned from people living in other parts of the world or even other parts of our towns, cities, and states. Through the lens of our camera, we can capture iconic scenes and captivating images from our travels - compelling snapshots of Life as we preserve memories for future generations. We have put together some tips and tricks for your next travel adventure. Please remember that the PSA has specific guidelines for travel photography and is a great resource should you wish to submit competitive Travel images.

Preparing for your trip

- Do your research: Look at postcards and travel guides, and do online searches for iconic locations ahead of time. Formulate a "shots list."
- Set goals ahead of time, and try to challenge yourself. For example, you might choose to focus on something specific as part of your trip (colorful doors in Dublin, cats on the Greek islands, etc...). You might also plan a scavenger hunt based on your pre-trip research.
- Learn a few words of greeting in the language of the country you will be visiting. This will go a long way in encouraging the locals to share elements of their way of life with you.
- Know your camera and equipment before your trip. Practice at home before leaving if your equipment is new. You want to be comfortable with your gear when you are exploring. Remember to pack extra batteries and memory cards.
- Bring a lightweight travel tripod.
- Travel as light as possible, and plan to always have your camera with you.
- Plan to "get lost on purpose" when you are away, as this will allow you to delve deeper into the place you are visiting. Make sure you have contact information for your hotel with you, in case you need to take a taxi back.

"A traveler seeks engagement with the local people and culture, while a sightseer just checks off sights in the guidebook. A sightseeing photographer stands apart from the culture, snapping pictures at a distance. A travel photographer becomes involved with his or her surroundings and the people; the resulting pictures become more intimate." – Jim Richardson, Travel Photographer

Setting the scene

- Look for the best light. The golden hour and blue hour are best. Warm afternoon light 1-2h before sunset is great for travel photos. Check the times for sunrise and sunset at your destination, and plan accordingly. Use the middle of the day for street photography or to visit museums and indoor venues.
- If you want to avoid sharing iconic scenes with a barrage of tourists, plan to arrive very early to beat the crowd. If you are traveling with others or in a group, plan some time for yourself to go out on your own to explore at your own pace.
- When you are exploring, be patient. You want to see not just with your eyes, but with your heart and mind, too (Expert Vagabond).
- Focus on the unusual, and work with details. Look for patterns and leading lines.
- Include a foreground, mid ground, and background: This allows the viewer to step into the scene.
- Look for distinctive vantage points and unique perspectives. Take your photos from different angles (wide, mid, close-up). If you are photographing a mountain, look for a subject that will showcase how big it is.
- Try to frame the subject creatively. For example, you can include trees framing a waterfall.
- Focus on storytelling.
- Add humans to your photos: They add emotion and allow the viewer to feel like they are experiencing the location. Humans can show scale and help tell a story. Make them anonymous; don't show faces. Or, you may choose to make the story about them and focus on their faces. If you do so, remember to ask for permission. You may find that many are very willing to participate (especially if you have taken the time to learn a few words in their language).
- Make sure interesting elements are not left out of the scene or cut off. (For example, mountaintops, people's feet).
- Make sure your horizons are straight.




Camera settings

- Consider working with a prime lens. They deliver excellent image quality and are lighter than zoom lenses.
- Shoot in RAW.
- Consider shooting in aperture mode. For landscapes, use f/8-f/11. For portraits, use a wider aperture.
- As a rule, your shutter speed should be no slower than 1/60 (especially when indoors), unless you have a tripod.
- Experiment with white balance: 'Cloudy' will increase the vibrancy of colors in green scenes (forests, green environments). It will also warm up beach and city scenes. 'Daylight' is best for direct sunlight during the day.
- Recommended ISO settings: 100-400 in sunlight; 400-800 on cloudy days; 800+ once the light gets too low or it becomes dark.
- Use exposure +/- to brighten or darken a scene as needed.


